### **Historic Turnout For Achiezer's Second Annual Far Rockaway Event**

Chani B. just didn't have enough time. The 25-year-old mother did not lack hours because she was busy tending to her three young children. Nor was she too wrapped up in her

job as a speech therapist. Chani B. had to undergo brain surgery in order to survive. The moments flew past her as her family, friends, and even local doctors desperately sought a way to pay the specialists. It was doubtful that an emergency fundraiser would collect the \$70,000 necessary.

Time was running out.

This past Memorial Day, in an overwhelming showing, nearly 500 members of the Far Rockaway community took time out from their evening to gather and reflect on the incredible work that Achiezer has done for over 900 families since September 2010. Hosted in the beautiful home of Rabbi and Mrs. Zvi Bloom, the barbecue was an appropriate cele-

bration of Achiezer's tremendous growth.

Rabbi Boruch Ber Bender founded Achiezer over two years ago. He began the program by pointing out that in *Bamidbar*, last week's *parashah*, each Jew in *Klal Yisrael* was counted through the donation of half a shekel. "Because" as Rabbi Bender noted, "a Jew is never whole when others are in need." To that end, he presented the *hakaras hatov* award to Mr. Phil Goldfeder, director of international affairs in Senator Charles Schumer's office. Rabbi Bender thanked him for all his constant assistance in making sure that others in need are taken care of with alacrity and professionalism. In turn, Mr. Goldfeder said that he wished to

thank Achiezer for all the help they give the community.

The word help encompasses many things in the Achiezer office. It means dignified mental health support, eldercare programs, financial aid, hospital support and patient advocacy, and, of course, insurance assistance.

Which is where Achiezer came in to help Chani. As soon as the case was brought to Achiezer's office, they went to work. Hundreds of e-mails and calls were exchanged between insurance companies, hospitals, and New York State government offices. Achiezer appealed directly to the heads of the insurance companies, and vari-

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ous officials. Achiezer staff members went so far as to rush to Manhattan in order to meet the executive director of the insurance company, on his way home from the office.

Just 72 hours before the surgery was scheduled to take place, faxes and e-mails began to buzz, and with true *siyata diShmaya*, the insurance was approved, leaving Chani time to go through the surgery with a promise of a normal future.

It is not just the services that they provide, it is the real people that they help and the lives that they change—families are kept intact, anxiety is relieved, dignity is preserved, crisis is averted. People are given peace of mind knowing that there is a caring expert at their side to help through their difficulty.

Rabbi Yissachar Frand lauded the work of Achiezer noting that they are the “One Stop Shopping” of organizations because, regardless of the complexity or nature of the issue that may arise, Achiezer’s vast resources are always ready to respond. Achiezer acts as a triage when an existing resource is there, and become interventional when a service is needed to be provided. This saves time and resources for our community.

Time is precious. Every moment is an opportunity and gift from Hashem. With the amazing work of Achiezer and its current bank of over 110 volunteers, Achiezer minimizes the stress of those who seek its help. Achiezer is not only a timesaver, it’s a lifesaver. ❖

## DRS HALB Honors Students Who Serve

On Lag B’Omer, the DRS HALB Yeshiva High School for Boys held its inaugural Nedivei Lev Service Society induction ceremony. The society, which recognizes those DRS students that have shown exemplary service to their school and community, was developed earlier this year as part of a multiyear partnership with Yeshiva University’s Institute for University School Partnership, part of the Azrieli Graduate School for Education.
